

Yasmar Garden and
St David's Open Day
11 May 2019



Entry to both properties is free.

Yasmar's Garden will be open from 11am to 3pm. Listed on the State Heritage Register, Yasmar House (1856-58) is the oldest extant building in Haberfield. Owned by the NSW State Government, entry to Yasmar House itself is prohibited due to its dangerous condition.

Entry is between 124 and 126 Chandos Street, Haberfield.

Noon: Presentation about Yasmar's garden will be given by Gina Plate, heritage and horticultural consultant, on the front verandah of Yasmar.

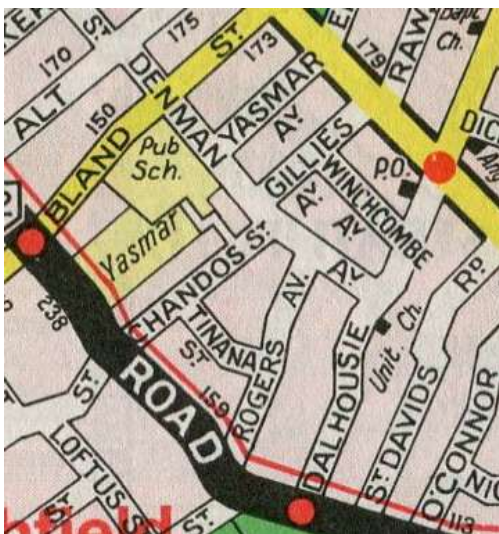
Sausage Sizzle lunch will be available for purchase.

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St David's Church and the Ramsay Family Vault and Burial Ground will be open from noon to 4pm. Alexander and Mary Learmonth (nee Ramsay), the first owners of *Yasmar*, are buried here- find the broken column.

Address is 51 Dalhousie Street (facing Denman Avenue), Haberfield.

Afternoon tea will be available for purchase from noon to 4pm in St David's Hall (1861-62), the second oldest extant building in Haberfield.



Suggested Itinerary

11am – noon: Arrive at Yasmar.

Noon: Gina Plate's presentation on Yasmar's garden.

To about 2pm: Sausage Sizzle lunch at Yasmar.

About 2pm: Walk from Yasmar, along Denman Avenue to St David's Church, Dalhousie Street.

2 – 3pm: Inspect St David's Church, Ramsay Family vault and burial ground.

3 - 4pm: Afternoon tea in St David's Hall.
