# Moment for the young at heart: Phil

## Bible Reading: Marie

### Introduction to the Hebrew Bible reading:

This passage from the book of Samuel, signals the new reign of David as king. It is a time of transition to a new way of doing things, an opportunity for a united kingdom, in a new city, with a new "shepherd-king." This alternate way of exercising power, not through brute domination but through caretaking, signals a radical shift. David's mission is not simply to hold power but to steward that power on behalf of God's people, as a shepherd stewards their flock.

## 2 Samuel 5:1-5, 9-10

Then all the tribes of Israel came to David at Hebron and said, "Look, we are your bone and flesh. <sup>2</sup> For some time, while Saul was king over us, it was you who led out Israel and brought it in. The Lord said to you, 'It is you who shall be shepherd of my people Israel, you who shall be ruler over Israel.' " <sup>3</sup> So all the elders of Israel came to the king at Hebron, and King David made a covenant with them at Hebron before the Lord, and they anointed David king over Israel. <sup>4</sup> David was thirty years old when he began to reign, and he reigned forty years. <sup>5</sup> At Hebron he reigned over Judah seven years and six months, and at Jerusalem he reigned over all Israel and Judah thirty-three years.

<sup>9</sup> David occupied the stronghold and named it the city of David. David built the city all around from the Millo inward. <sup>10</sup> And David became greater and greater, for the Lord of hosts<sup>[b]</sup> was with him.

## Mark 6:1-13

He left that place and came to his hometown, and his disciples followed him. <sup>2</sup> On the Sabbath he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astounded. They said, "Where did this man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been given to him? What deeds of power are being done by his hands! <sup>3</sup> Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary<sup>[a]</sup> and brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?" And they took offense<sup>[b]</sup> at him. <sup>4</sup> Then Jesus said to them, "Prophets are not without honour, except in their hometown and among their own kin and in their own house." <sup>5</sup> And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and cured them. <sup>6</sup> And he was amazed at their unbelief.

Then he went about among the villages teaching. <sup>7</sup> He called the twelve and began to send them out two by two and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. <sup>8</sup> He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff: no bread, no bag, no money in their belts, <sup>9</sup> but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. <sup>10</sup> He said to them, "Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. <sup>11</sup> If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them." <sup>12</sup> So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. <sup>13</sup> They cast out many demons and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.

#### **Communion:**

This is the table, not of the Church, but of Jesus. It is to be made ready for those who love him and those who want to love him more. So, come, you who are hungry for God's love. Come, you who are yearning the Christ's presence. Come, you who want community; know that you are welcome here.

Why have we gathered here? We come because we have been called to live out a story.

What story shall we live? The story of saving love.

Where did this story begin? It was whispered before time began. It was sung in the melody of Creation.

Whose story is this?

This story is God's alone to tell. It hums in the rivers and the trees. It whispers in the skies and the seas. It calls to the people of all places. It speaks in our hearts, in our lives.

Why then should we speak of this story? This story calls our name in Creation. This story claims our lives through the Cross. This story shaped our future through the Spirit. We are its telling in this time and this place.

So tell me the story of this night and of this table.

The Lord Jesus, on the night when he was betrayed took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it (bread is broken).

Tell me what he said and did. **'This is my body which is broken for you.**  Do this in remember me'.

Tell me what he said and did next (lift cup) In the same was, he took the cup and said 'This is a new covenant in my love. Drink it and remember me'.

This is our common story, our deep memory, our true destiny.

So, let it also be our story-telling, our testimony. Let's celebrate the way that grace has shaped our lives. I invite you to say aloud what you are thankful for...

(we share what we are thankful for)

Hear the storytelling of all ages singing with us: (sung response TIS 761)

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest!

What is our prayer on this day? (everyone holds their hands in blessing)

Pour out your Holy spirit on us, so that this everyday meal becomes an eternal feast. So that our eating and drinking today unites us with Christ making us one body. So we know that you live in us and that we live in you. So that we live in your world knowing it is indeed yours. Living God, this is our prayer Amen

Distribution

Let us receive this holy sacrament of the body and blood of Christ, and feed on him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving.
