Moment of Stillness:

Christ Candle:

We light this light to remind us that Christ is the light of the world. As we light this light, we remember that God; Creator, Christ and Spirit is present among us.

Acknowledgement of First Peoples:

As we gather, we recognise that this land is sacred land, this land is holy ground.

We acknowledge the First Peoples of this land on which we worship God today, the Gadigal and Wangal people. We honour them for their custodianship of sacred stories, of dreamings and connections with the deep earth and oceans.

We pay our respects to the elders past, present and emerging and commit to walking with them for justice and reconciliation.

Call to Worship: (Season of Creation)

Our land is alive with the glory of God desert sands hum and gum trees dance. Brown grasses sing and mountains breathe their stillness. All created things add their rhythms of delight and even the stones shout out their praise.

Let our voices mingle with those of the earth; may our hearts join the beat of her joy, for the Holy One is with us; the Source of all being surrounds and upholds us. Christ Jesus walks beside and before us. The Spirit moves within and between us. Blessed be God, our wonder and delight.

Bible Reading: Marie

Introduction to the Hebrew Bible reading:

Song of Songs is one of only two biblical books, along with Esther, where there is no mention of God. The poems are spoken by a man, a woman, and a chorus that periodically comments on what is happening between the two lovers. Unlike most books in the bible, the woman's voice is clearly heard; in the intimacy and anticipation of love, her voice rings out.

Song of Songs 2:8-13 (NRSV)

The voice of my beloved! Look. he comes. leaping upon the mountains, bounding over the hills. ⁹ My beloved is like a gazelle or a young stag. Look, there he stands behind our wall, gazing in at the windows, looking through the lattice. ¹⁰ My beloved speaks and says to me: "Arise, my love, my fair one, and come away, ¹¹ for now the winter is past. the rain is over and gone. ¹² The flowers appear on the earth; the time of singing has come, and the voice of the turtledove is heard in our land. ¹³ The fig tree puts forth its figs, and the vines are in blossom: they give forth fragrance.

Arise, my love, my fair one, and come away.

Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23 (NRSV)

Now when the Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around him, they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with defiled hands, that is, without washing them. (For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, do not eat unless they thoroughly wash their hands, thus observing the tradition of the elders; and they do not eat anything from the market unless they wash it; and there are also many other traditions that they observe, the washing of cups, pots, and bronze kettles.) So the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, "Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the elders, but eat with defiled hands?" He said to them, "Isaiah prophesied rightly about you hypocrites, as it is written, 'This people honors me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines.' You abandon the commandment of God and hold to human tradition." Then he called the crowd again and said to them, "Listen to me, all of you, and understand: there is nothing outside a person that by going in can defile, but the things that come out are what defile."

For it is from within, from the human heart, that evil intentions come: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person."

Communion:

This is the table, not of the Church, but of Jesus. It is to be made ready for those who love him and those who want to love him more. So, come, you who are hungry for God's love. Come, you who are yearning the Christ's presence. Come, you who want community; know that you are welcome here. Why have we gathered here? We come because we have been called to live out a story.

What story shall we live? **The story of saving love.**

Where did this story begin? It was whispered before time began. It was sung in the melody of Creation.

Whose story is this? This story is God's alone to tell. It hums in the rivers and the trees. It whispers in the skies and the seas. It calls to the people of all places. It speaks in our hearts, in our lives.

Why then should we speak of this story? This story calls our name in Creation. This story claims our lives through the Cross. This story shaped our future through the Spirit. We are its telling in this time and this place.

So, tell me the story of this night and of this table.

The Lord Jesus, on the night when he was betrayed took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it (bread is broken).

Tell me what he said and did. 'This is my body which is broken for you. Do this to make me real to you.

Tell me what he said and did next (lift cup) In the same way, he took the cup and said 'This is a new covenant in my love. Drink it to make me real to you.

This is our common story, our deep memory, our true destiny.

So, let it also be our story-telling, our testimony. Let's celebrate the way that grace has shaped our lives. I invite you to say aloud what you are thankful for...

(we share what we are thankful for)

Hear the storytelling of all ages singing with us: (sung response TIS 761)

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest!

What is our prayer on this day? (everyone holds their hands in blessing)

Pour out your Holy spirit on us, so that this everyday meal becomes an eternal feast. So that our eating and drinking today unites us with Christ making us one body. So we know that you live in us and that we live in you. So that we live in your world knowing it is indeed yours. Living God, this is our prayer Amen

Distribution

Let us receive this holy sacrament of the body and blood of Christ, and feed on him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

Concluding prayer In gratitude, in deep gratitude for this moment, this meal, these people, we give ourselves to you. Take us out to live as changed people because we have shared the Living Bread and cannot remain the same. May we live to your glory, bringing your love and peace to your world. Amen.
